
We will be holding an Officers Training on the Coast, Wednesday July 21st. Our committee is working on some new ideas, with hopes of making Officers Training fun, and exciting.

Tessa Behnke's 4-H Story

2010 Russell Preston Scholarship Winner



Hello, my name is Tessa Behnke. I am eighteen, and just graduated from Ukiah High. Since 1st grade, 4-H has been a major aspect of who I am. It does not entirely define me, but it has been a huge influence on how I see the world and how I operate within it. In my past years in 4-H, I have participated in Rabbits, Horses, Dogs, Goats, Sewing, Quilting, Cooking, Spinning, Jr. Toastmasters, Vet Science, Embryology, High School 4-H, and several other projects. I have certainly gotten the full 4-H project experience.

In addition to 4-H, I am President of the Ukiah High Interact club. It is a community service club, but is very exciting and interesting. It requires a lot of student/adult collaboration, and a lot of problem solving. I am also Captain of the Ukiah High Mock Trial team. Last year, I was a prosecution attorney, but this year I took on both sides of the case as a prosecution and defense attorney. I am very proud of the accomplishments of my team, even though we did not proceed to the state competition this year. When I do not have commitments at home, I love traveling. My siblings are often my destination, but they move around the world too. In my short life, I have already visited many states, as well as Switzerland, France, South Africa, Mexico, and Haiti. This summer, I am going to visit my sister in Hungary, and our former exchange student in Germany.

Because of my challenging course load, and the unfortunate closing of my former club, Hopland 4-H, I am now only enrolled in High School 4-H, as my main club, and the T.R.A.I.L. project. Weekly, I volunteer with the T.R.A.I.L. (Teaching Riding as an Access to Independence and Learning) program, a non-profit organization that helps kids deal with physical, mental, and social disabilities. This is perfect for me because I love working with horses. I exercise the horses, ride, and even clean stalls. I am also now trained to help with lessons. I lead the horse, and I am also trusted to work with the kids to get the horses



ready. I have learned the value of patience, as well as how to adapt to the different learning styles of the kids. No matter where I end up, I want to find a similar program to help with in college. It is truly an invaluable experience for the kids and for the volunteers.

I have become a better, more rounded person because of 4-H. I have learned and improved my critical communication, citizenship, leadership, and life skills. As an older 4-H member, younger members look up to me, and I have accepted that responsibility. In past years, I have attended 4-H California Focus, California

State Leadership Conference, and a Rotary sponsored leadership conference. However, conferences alone do not make one a leader. My background in 4-H gives me personal knowledge of many of the projects, but my willingness to challenge myself has helped me involve myself in 4-H in a greater way.

Last summer, I was one of four youth directors for Mendocino/Lake County 4-H camp. After overwhelming amounts of preparation, including finishing nametags a week before camp, we finally made it to Camp Masonite Navarro. I immediately found myself somewhat overwhelmed by an abundance of questions, and a sea of kids. After several kids fainted, due to heat and many other factors, I realized it would be a long week. As

a director, I woke up before the kids, and went to bed after the kids. When the kids were doing their various activities, the directors would hold "meetings" in the camp's walk-in refrigerator. Although the experience was physically and mentally exhausting, it was completely worth it. Being able to help provide the opportunities that our 4-H camp offers gives me the chance to return the favor for all the wonderful years I have spent at the same camp. I learned more about problem solving, than ever before in my life. I had fun, despite the challenges. Not surprisingly, I am a director again this year. We only have three youth directors, but we have the addition of three deans as well. Preparation for camp this year has included defining the role of our

deans. We have the maximum number of kids attending camp this year, and we have to reevaluate the camp schedule and procedure to accommodate such a large group. It is wonderful that, even in tough economic times, so many kids and adults want to attend camp. I will be extremely sad when camp is over, as this is my last year as a 4-Her.

4-H is not simply about going to fair, camp, or monthly community meetings; it is about the relationships and bonds formed in all of those activities. I have many friends from 4-H. We share a common history, a lot of laughs, and great memories. I have made many lasting connections with the adult volunteers, who are the backbone of what we do. One in particular, is my "4-H Mom," Linda Edgington. She has held many positions, such as 4-H parent, leader, and program representative, but she is really a member at heart. Linda can bring any group together, and she does an amazing amount for 4-H in Mendocino County. 4-H is also about growing up in a stable, loving community that fosters self-esteem, and instills necessary life skills. It seems like every week I have to give a speech or presentation in school. I do not fear public speaking, as many kids do, however, because I have been doing presentations in 4-H for the past 10 years. The showmanship and round robin competitions I participated in help me keep my concentration and collection under pressure.

I am lucky enough to have many options in my life. I realize that I must adapt to new circumstances and events as they arise, but I do have a few goals in

mind at this point in my life. In the fall, I plan to attend Colorado State University in Fort Collins, Colorado. I am a math/science minded person. I like to think about solving problems, rather than analyzing literature. I do not have a specific career in mind yet, but I think a scientific career would be the best for me. I am attracted to the environmental science field and I want to pursue field research as well as laboratory research. There is something very satisfying about outdoor work and accomplishing something with your own hands. When I later identify a specific area of interest, I will probably go to graduate school to get an advanced degree in that area. I really enjoy traveling, and in college, I am definitely going to take advantage of the study abroad program. After college, I am considering joining the Peace Corps, or a similar organization, to have another unique cultural adventure. I want to take full advantage of the options presented in college, and beyond.

I am sure that 4-H has aided me in ways I am not even aware of at this point in my life. Wearing all white with a green hat and scarf may not have been incredibly fun all the time, but being a part of this wonderful organization has helped me become who I am today. I love claiming that I can wear Carhartt gear because I am in 4-H. Raising rabbits in 4-H fueled my love of animals, but also showed me the responsibilities that they entail. When I have kids, I want them to be 4-Hers, and pledge their heads to clearer thinking, hearts to greater loyalty, hands to larger service, and their health to better living.


Redwood Valley/Calpella 4-H Club Submitted by Bryon Norcross
