New Member Enrollment Update

During the course of enrolling 4-H members for the 2010-11 year, the questions we've received have had some consistent themes. We'd like to clarify those questions here. First, the 4-H age of a member is based on their age as of December 31 of the current 4-H year. Second, Cloverbud (primary members) are enrolled in K-third grade or are five to eight years old. A member becomes a junior member at 4th grade OR nine years of age. That means a third grader who turns nine before December 31 can enroll as a junior member (and thus compete for awards and take part in large animal projects).

As part of the enrollment process, each new leader must attend one orientation with 4-H staff prior to starting any project. (See dates above.)

There are three steps to enrollment:

1) paperwork returned, 2) fingerprints cleared, and 3) orientation completed before any project meeting can be held by the leader. Each project meeting MUST have a leader and another adult (over 21) in attendance at all times.

To be sure we have adequate materials, please RSVP to the 4-H Office at 463-4495 with your name and your project(s).

If you are charged a Livescan fee, send your receipt to the 4-H Office for reimbursement.

It also means that members in 4th grade and 8 years old count as junior members. Senior members are in grades 9 to 12.

Also note that Cloverbud members may not compete in any way, whether as part of proficiencies, record books, Presentation Day, Extravaganza, etc. Their record book is different than junior and senior members and does NOT carry over to their junior member personal development report (PDR). This is a State 4-H policy, and county programs may not alter it. Counties can, however, be more strict if we so desire.

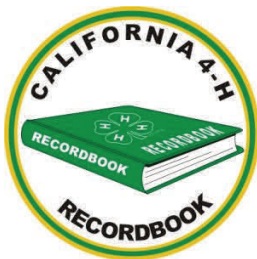
Ranch Horse Clinic October 29

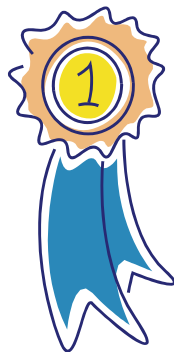


Our next general meeting will be held on October 3, 2011, at 7 pm at the Methodist Church on Main Street. Members were asked to bring gently used coats for our coat drive.

In addition to record keeping, the 4-H Record Book gives members an opportunity to reflect on their year, measure their achievements and growth, and set goals and develop plans to meet those goals. The 4-H Record Book has undergone transformations over the years to ensure that it meets the needs of our 4-H members. Beginning in September, the new 4-H Online Record Book will be unveiled. This newest transformation will re-engage young people through a new, fun interactive format that offers social networking opportunities for 4-H members and adult volunteers within clubs.
