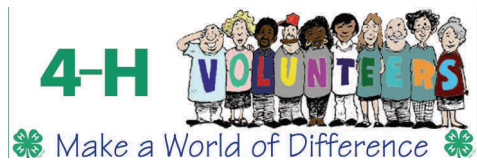

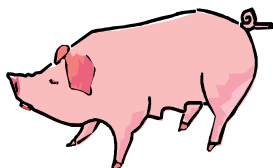


Long Valley 4-H Club

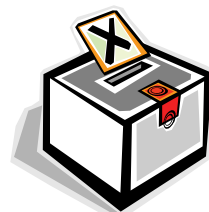
We are all pretty happy with our new sweatshirts. They turned out great. Look for us in 4-H Green :-)

Swine Showmanship & Clipping Field Day

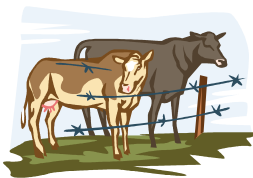

8. Receive recognition and learn the importance of being both a good winner and a good loser.
9. Share ideas and make friends with other 4-H members.

Objectives of Extension 4-H Youth Program

1. To help youth develop knowledge and practical skills in science and technology.
2. To stimulate the personal growth and physical, mental, and behavioral development of youth.
3. To help youth become responsible citizens.
4. To develop effective adult and youth leadership.

3. Encourage creativity.
